- From the Library: Dedicated to Con Roux. I have had a problem with "I believe in the communion of saints", to the extent I sometimes omit it when saying the Apostles' Creed. Accidently I came across an explanation for this written by Hugh Burnaby which made sense. This clause was a late addition to the Creed, and there is no evidence of its use till near the end of the fourth century. Moreover, there seems to be some doubt as to why it was put in, and what it was intended to mean. Many different interpretations have been suggested: we are at liberty to choose the one which we prefer. For myself, the interpretation which I like best, and which, I think, is a legitimate one, is that which takes it to express what has been called "the intimate union and conjunction of all believers with one another in Christ – a union not broken by death". That the Church is an organism which derives its unity from Christ, is part, at least, of what St Paul meant when he spoke of the Church as the Body of Christ. "We," he said, "who are many, are one body in Christ" (Romans xii: 5). And since he could speak of the "dead in Christ" and believe that when he died he would be "with Christ" (1 Thessalonians iv: 16, Philippians I: 23), it would seem to follow that the unity of the Body of Christ is one which cannot be broken by death. If both the living and the dead are "in Christ", then their communion with one another is not broken. In the New Testament, and notably in St Paul's Epistles, the saints are all the members of the Church without distinction. It has sometimes been maintained that the Church should consist only of those who are holy in this sense - that membership of the Church should be confined to those who reach a certain standard of goodness, and that unworthy members should be excluded. But such an idea has always been rejected by the Church as a whole.

It would surely be wrong to exclude from the sphere in which the Holy Spirit works those who most need His help. Excommunication is a desperate remedy. Members of the Church then may be "saints" in the making; they are not necessarily saints in fact; and the idea of a "pure Church" in this world is certainly not a New Testament one.

Belief in the Communion of Saints is, therefore, according to our definition, belief in the fellowship of *all* believers in Christ. And further, it is a fellowship that is not broken by death – and that because it is a fellowship in Him who has overcome death. The desire to find a bridge

over the stream of death, by which the living may communicate with the departed, is a natural one. The Christian believes that his fellowship with the departed is mediated through Christ. If communion of the Christian with Christ is not broken by death, then neither can his communion with his fellow Christians be broken.

The recorded teaching of Jesus contains hardly any reference to the conditions of life in the next world. And the reason is clear. It is with this life that we are concerned, and morbid curiosity about the next life would distract our attention from what should be our immediate and pressing concern. We find eternal life, not by peering through the gate of death, but by ascending in heart and mind to the things that are above. In Christ we are all one; and death cannot destroy that unity. If so, we must surely believe that to *pray* for the departed is not only legitimate but inevitable.

If our communion with those whom we love is not broken by death, how can we cease to pray for them as we did when alive? Indeed, it is precisely in prayer that we may expect to realise most keenly our fellowship with them, and may know that we are "knit together in one communion and fellowship, in the mystical Body of Christ our Lord".
