DIOCESE OF THE HIGHVELD COVID-19 PROTOCOLS UNDER ALERT LEVEL 3

1. No casual visits will be allowed - no mask, no entry allowed. Only absolutely necessary appointments will be considered (which must be arranged beforehand!) and everyone must be screened and sanitised at the Security Managers station before entering the office building. A record will be kept of the names and contact details of anyone entering the premises. Once screening has been completed, Security will confirm your arrival to your host – please wait for confirmation that your host is ready to receive you before entering the building. If a visitor presents with any symptoms they will not be granted access and will be asked to leave the property

immediately. N.B. No access will be allowed to other areas of the building without prior notice

- 1.1. All deliveries and collections will only be processed at the Security Office and placed in the boxes provided please ensure that you record your delivery in the register.
- 2. **Bishop's meetings** Attendees must report to the Security Office on arrival to be screened before entering the meeting area. No access will be granted if any adverse symptoms are present during the screening process. Everyone must sanitise on entering the meeting venue and record their contact details on the Meeting Register. Attendees are to sit at least one and a half metres apart during the meeting and practice proper social distancing during the taking of any breaks/refreshments that may be provided.

From the Library: Billy Graham had a son Franklin who spent his early life kicking over the traces. One is reminded of the conversion of Saul when God met him on the road to Damascus and confronted him about the persecution of his church. Franklin Graham wrote his autobiography in 1995 to explain to the world his hedonistic lifestyle until met by Jesus Christ, was converted to Christianity and worked for the Christian charity Samaritan's Purse. Rebel with a Cause is Franklin's account of his early struggles and his late triumphs. By the time Franklin was a young man he was running from God and from the public's high expectations of him as the oldest son of the best-known preacher of our time. But finally, God caught up with Franklin, and Graham's daredevil, destructive life was from that point forward transformed into a creative, God-glorifying adventure. God instilled in Franklin a passion for the suffering and oppressed people of the world. Rebel with a Cause recounts Franklin Graham's often dangerous adventures as a worldwide emissary of Christ's compassion: opening a medical clinic and orphanage in war-torn Rwanda; setting up a shelter in Croatia for Bosnian girls raped by enemy soldiers and many other things. "I share my life, not because I think there is anything particularly special about it, but because I want you to understand how great and capable God is of using anyone's life to accomplish His goals. If there's anything special about my story, it's not because I'm the son of Billy and Ruth Graham, but because I'm a son of the living God.

Another person who had a conversion experience was Beyers Naudė who gave up a life of privilege in the NGK and the Broederbond to lend a hand to the suffering of South Africans In 1960 a World Council of Churches conference was held at Cottesloe in Johannesburg. The Calvinist Afrikaans denominations also attended. At the end of the conference the various denominations signed an agreement of intent, a clause of which condemned race issues. Some churches refused to sign it, one being Beyers Naudė. He left the NGK and started the Christian Institute to further his interpretation of the scriptural principle against apartheid. Naudė was banned for five years then a further three years. Beyers Naudė died in 2004 and was given a state funeral. His biography, by Colleen Ryan, is entitled *Beyers Naudė Pilgrimage of Faith* and you are to read the 2005 edition, the story of a remarkable South African.
